# **Admissions and appeals for the admission year 2017/18**

# Admissions

## Statement of Policy

The Academy is committed to:

- admitting an intake, reflecting all communities and the whole range of ability;
- resolving a situation where there are many more applications than places available;
- ensuring a consistency of approach in a potentially extremely emotive area;
- demonstrating that we are applying our oversubscription criteria equally and fairly;
- ensuring that children with Special Needs and vulnerable children are not treated less favourably than other applicants;
- working collaboratively with South Bradford Schools to improve behaviour and reduce exclusions by agreeing to the Fair Access Protocol.

## The aims are:

- to ensure that places are awarded fairly and openly;
- to ensure that all prospective parents/students are aware of the admissions procedures;
- to guarantee that all legitimate applications will be processed efficiently and within an agreed time span;
- to demonstrate that our procedures comply with the School Admissions Code;
- to provide an appropriate Appeal procedure for those who are dissatisfied with the outcome of their applications.

## Procedures for Year 7 intake

### *The admission arrangements are:*

- a) There are 165 places available.
- b) Applications for places at the Academy will be made in accordance with the local authorities Coordinated Admission Scheme, as published on local authorities' websites and in Bradford Local Authority's booklet "A guide for parents about admission arrangements to Secondary Schools". Where the Academy receives more applications than places available, the oversubscription criteria for admission will apply.
- c) Applications have to be made on both the Common Application Form (CAF) provided by local authorities **and** the Dixons supplementary form which can be completed online, or obtained directly from the Academy or from Bradford Local Authority's website. There will be a strict deadline for return of the supplementary form; forms received by this deadline will be considered first.

## Oversubscription criteria

The Academy will admit up to 165 children in the relevant age group each year if sufficient applications are received. All applicants will be admitted if 165 or fewer apply.

If the Academy is oversubscribed, after the admission of children with a Statement of Special Educational Needs or an Education, Health and Care Plan, where the Academy is named, priority for admission will be given to those children who sit the assessment and who meet the criteria in the order set out below:

- a) Looked-after children or children who were previously looked-after e.g. because they were adopted or became subject to a residence or special guardianship order. (See note 1 for a definition of the term looked-after child.)
- b) Sixteen places will be awarded to children who show a particular aptitude for Performing Arts.
- c) Up to three children of staff who have been in post for at least two years or to staff recently appointed to a post for which there is a demonstrable skill shortage.
- d) Children whose siblings at the time of application are within Years 7 to 10 at the Academy and who live at the same address. (See note 2 for a definition of the term sibling.)
- e) All other children. Places will be filled on the basis of independently scrutinised random allocation.
- f) Children whose parents did not return/complete a supplementary form by the advertised deadline but named the Academy on the CAF, in the order set out above.

If demand exceeds places at points c) and d), places will be decided based upon random allocation.

### *Exceptions*

The criteria listed in the above policy **may** be overridden and a place offered, based on:

- i) special medical reasons for admission where they are deemed essential by an independent professional recommendation from the child's paediatrician/consultant, or
- ii) social reasons for admission where they are deemed essential by an independent professional.

Allocation of a place would be decided based on receipt of a letter by the governors and where the governors consider that a place should be offered on these grounds.

### *Twins or triplets*

Where a family of twins or triplets request admission and only one of the children can be offered a place, the remaining sibling(s) will also be offered a place/(s) above the admission number.

### *Notes*

1. A looked-after child is a child who is in the care of the local authority, or being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (as defined in the Children Act 1989).
2. The term sibling includes legally adopted children, and step- and half-brothers or sisters *living at the same address*. Please note that we are heavily oversubscribed and we cannot always guarantee to offer a place to every sibling.

## **Admitting children of all abilities**

Our intake is representative of the full ability range and exactly matches the ability profile of the children applying.

To achieve this, all applicants by the deadline are invited to take a non-verbal reasoning assessment to divide them into 9 ability bands or “stanines”, from Band 1 at the bottom up to Band 9 at the top. We will admit the required number from each band based on the spread of ability of those applying.

The assessment is externally set by a well-respected educational assessment agency and the papers are collected by the agency to be marked. The Academy is then provided with a list of each child’s assessment mark, similar to an IQ score, with 100 being the average. The marks are divided into nine bands and we are instructed how many children to take from each band e.g. if 20% of those applying are identified in band 5, then 20% of our intake has to be from this band. This ensures that the 165 places we offer reflect the ability range of our applicants.

The likelihood of being offered a place at the Academy is the same in every band.

The assessment is not a traditional entrance exam which children either pass or fail. It is done to ensure that we take a fair number of children across the whole ability range.

## **Performing Arts places**

There are sixteen places (10% of our intake) available each year for children who demonstrate a particular aptitude for performing arts.

To apply for one of these places parents must complete the Supplementary Form, including the Performing Arts page, and return it to the Academy by the deadline.

All applicants for these places will be required to attend workshops and, if they opt to apply for a chosen specialism, an audition, in order to be considered for one of these places.

Children who are unsuccessful in gaining a performing arts place will still be considered for one of the remaining places, along with all other applicants.

## **Calendar for admission**

### *End of July 2016*

Dixons’ supplementary form available online, for download from the Academy website or as a paper copy from Reception.

### *Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> September 2016*

Open evening. Arrival time is from 4.15pm to 6.00pm. Principal’s presentations will take place at 4.30pm, 5.15pm and 6.00pm, with each presentation being followed by a tour.

### *Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> September 2016*

3.30pm deadline for receipt of the supplementary form.

### *Friday 14<sup>th</sup> October 2016*

Performing Arts process for all applicants who apply for Performing Arts and whose supplementary forms are received by the deadline.

Where possible, and in line with the School Admissions Code, parents will be informed of the outcome of the Performing Arts application prior to the local authorities CAF deadline.

### *Saturday 15<sup>th</sup> October 2016*

Non-verbal reasoning assessments for all applicants whose supplementary forms are received by the deadline.

*31<sup>st</sup> October 2016*

Deadline for submission of the local authorities' CAF.

*1<sup>st</sup> March 2017*

Local authorities write with offers made to parents for all schools in their schemes.

In the event of oversubscription, those children who cannot be offered a place will automatically remain on the waiting list at the Academy until the end of December.

### **In-year admissions**

- There are 165 places in each year group.
- All parents must also complete an in-year application form, available from the local authorities, as part of the co-ordinated admission scheme.

Where vacancies occur, places are not offered based on the length of time names have been on the list. They are filled in coordination with the local authorities and in line with the oversubscription criteria above. It is, therefore, possible that a child may be added to the list who qualifies higher within the admission policy than children already on the list. Wherever possible, places are also filled on a like-for-like basis based upon the ability band of the child who is leaving.

The Governing Council is prepared to go up to 2% above the in-year admission number to accommodate vulnerable children, on the advice of the local authority.

### **Post 16 applications**

Year 11 students may proceed into Year 12 where the minimum and/or specific course entry requirements are met. Full details of these will be published in the Post-16 (sixth-form) application prospectus that is available annually. Students not currently on roll who wish to join Post-16 must complete an application form and return it to the Academy by the advertised deadline date.

## **Waiting lists and appeals**

If your child is not offered a place at the Academy, your child's details will automatically remain on the waiting list until the end of December in that admission year. After this date, you will need to contact the Academy on an annual basis to ask for your child's details to be kept on the waiting list in case a place becomes available.

Furthermore, if you wish your child to be considered for a place at the Academy, you would also need to re-apply each year on the local authorities' in-year application form.

Where places become available they will be allocated in accordance with the oversubscription criteria above and will be fair-banded.

If you are dissatisfied with the admission decision, you will have the right of appeal. The Appeals Panel is independent of the Academy. The Panel's decision is final and binding on the Academy.
